Monday- Mummifying a tomato

You will need:

2 tomatoes paper towel

Salt plastic container

Knife and spoon weighing scales

Instructions:

- 1. First, gather your equipment. You will be completing the first section of your table (before mummification).

 You will need to write down: what your tomato looks like, smells like, its texture (what it feels like) and appearance (what it looks like).
- 2. Next, get the tomatoes and ask an adult to slice of the top. With the spoon scoop the insides out of both the tomatoes.
- 3. Then, using a paper towel dry the insides of both tomatoes. Fill one tomato with salt and leave the other tomato empty.
- 4. Finally, place both tomatoes in the plastic container and leave for a few days.





A hypothesis tells us what we think will happen in our experiment.


Your hypothesis might look something like this.






